

## Haskells at Gettysburg Annotated Bibliography from Haskell Journal

--- (Summer-Fall, 1992). *HASKELL: HERO OF GETTYSBURG Lieut. Haskell Saves the Day for Union Forces.* Haskell Journal: Vol. VIII, No. 4, Iss. 32. pp 503, 506-520.

The author describes the 3<sup>rd</sup> day of the Battle of Gettysburg through the eyes of Frank Aretas Haskell<sup>7</sup> (Aretas<sup>6</sup>, Job<sup>5</sup>, Job<sup>4</sup>, Wm<sup>3</sup>, Mark<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>) as written in a letter to his brother, Harrison. It is taken from **Haskell of Gettysburg** edited by Frank L. Byrne and Andrew T. Weaver. Haskell was an officer in the 6<sup>th</sup> Wisconsin Regular Volunteer Infantry and at the "Head Quarters 2<sup>nd</sup> Corp d'Armie Army of the Potomac. Two pictures of Haskell and three maps are included.

-- (Winter 1993). *WHERE WAS PICKETT? Who lead the charge that bears his name?.* Haskell Journal: Vol IX, No. 1, Iss 33. Pp. 539, 542-544.

The author of this article has taken excerpts from **The Haskell Memoirs** by John Cheves Haskell<sup>7</sup> (Charles T<sup>6</sup>, Elnathan<sup>5-4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Mark<sup>2</sup>, Roger<sup>1</sup>) to describe Pickett's charge on the third day of the Battle of Gettysburg through his eyes. Capt. Haskell gives his perspective from the Confederate side, as he was in command of a Confederate artillery battery at Gettysburg. Note is also made that his brother Capt. William T. Haskell was killed during the second day of the battle of Gettysburg. Included is a picture of John C. Haskell, a map of the routes of Pickett, Pettigrew, & Trimble Brigades attacking the Union army at the "Angle", a picture of a memorial plaque in memory of Charles Thomson Haskell, his wife, and their children including John Cheves and William T. Haskell.

Jensen, E. B. (Summer-Fall, 1992). *Haskell Descendents Elected Delegates to Montana's Constitutional Convention.* Haskell Journal: Vol. VIII, No. 4, Iss. 32. Pp. 524-525.

This article is extracted from Eva B. Jensen's book , **The Ancestry of Major John Burnham and Abigail Collins.** She describes two descendants of William and Mary Tybbot Haskell who were delegates to Montana's Constitutional Conventions, the

first in 1889. Before moving to Montana, Henri James Haskell<sup>8</sup> (Aretas<sup>7</sup>, Joseph<sup>8</sup>, Nathaniel<sup>5</sup>, Job<sup>4</sup>, Wm<sup>3</sup>, Mark<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>) fought at the Battle of Gettysburg, at the age of nineteen, with the First Maine Cavalry, returning to Maine to recuperate from a wound received in the war. Includes his picture.

Walling, Cheves. (Winter 1993). *Letter to the Editor*. Haskell Journal: Vol IX, No. 1, Iss 33. P.553.

The author notes that grandfather, Alexander Cheves Haskell<sup>7</sup> (Charles T<sup>6</sup>, Elnathan<sup>5</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Mark<sup>2</sup>, Roger<sup>1</sup>) lost a brother at the Battle of Gettysburg and that “future brother-in-law, Edward Porter Alexander...was in command of Longstreet’s artillery and responsible for the Confederate artillery fire...some of his memoirs have...been published as **Fighting for the Confederacy, the Personal Recollections of General Edward Porter Alexander**.

Those with access to the **Newsletter of the Haskell Society**: Win Haskell, editor, has three articles relating to the Battle of Gettysburg:

-- (June 1995). *In Memoriam: The American Civil War 1861-1865*. Newsletter of the Haskell Family Society: Vol. 4, No. 2. Pp. 8-10.

The article includes a list of 80 Haskells who fought in the Civil War by “name, unit, date, cause and location of death. Included are 15 who fought at the Battle of Gettysburg [by cross checking regiment with regiments fighting at Gettysburg]. Three died of wounds received at the Battle of Gettysburg.

-- (Sep 1995). *US Civil War 1861-1865: Haskells wounded/disabled*. Newsletter of the Haskell Family Society: Vol.4, No. 3. pp. 6-9.

This article includes a list of 100 wounded or disabled Haskells who fought in the Civil War by name, unit, wound/disability, place and date. Twenty (20) fought at Gettysburg with the possibility of four more who had received wounds before the Battle of Gettysburg but may have rejoined their unit and also fought at Gettysburg. Three Haskell fought on the Confederate side, the rest with the Union.

- (June 1997). *Did you know department?* Newsletter of the Haskell Family Society: Vol.6, No. 2. pp. 9-10.

The author of this article describes the Confederate Southern Cross of the Legion of Honour that recognized Confederate soldiers valour. Thomas B. Haskell, born in Dorset, England, who had immigrated to South Carolina and fought with the Army of Northern Virginia, was the recipient of this award. He was severely wounded at the Battle of Gettysburg.

- (Dec 1995). *Did you know department?* Newsletter of the Haskell Family Society: Vol. 4, No. 4. pp. 12-13.

The author describes Fort Haskell within the Petersburg National Battlefield Park, VA named for Colonel Frank Aretas Haskell<sup>7</sup> (Aretas<sup>6</sup>, Job<sup>5</sup>, Job<sup>4</sup>, Wm<sup>3</sup>, Mark<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>) who fought at the Battle of Gettysburg among other battles. A bio and picture of F. A. Haskell is included.
