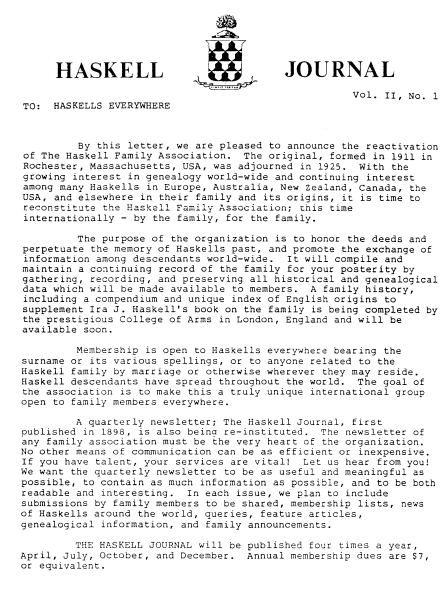
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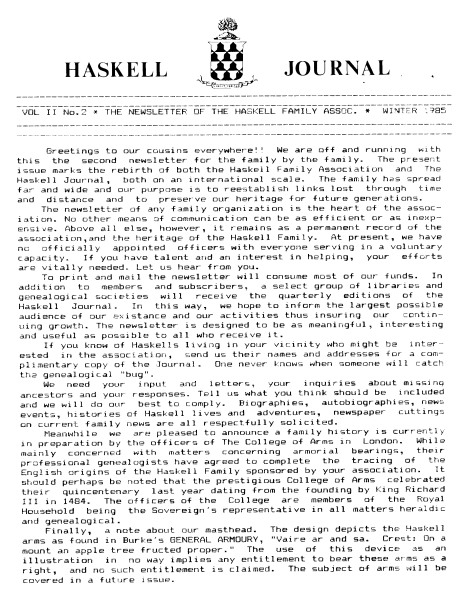
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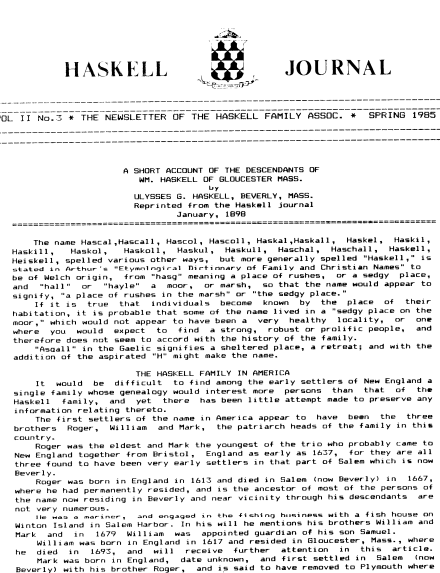
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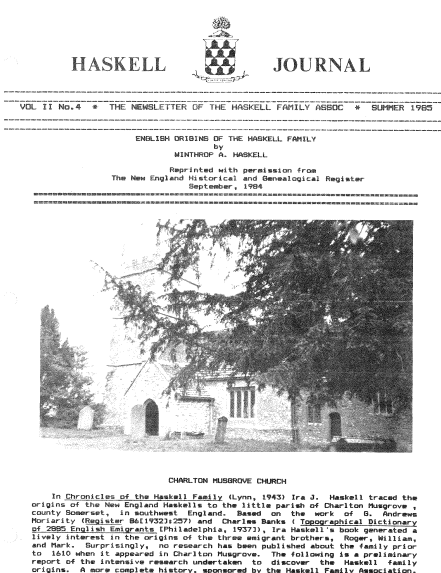
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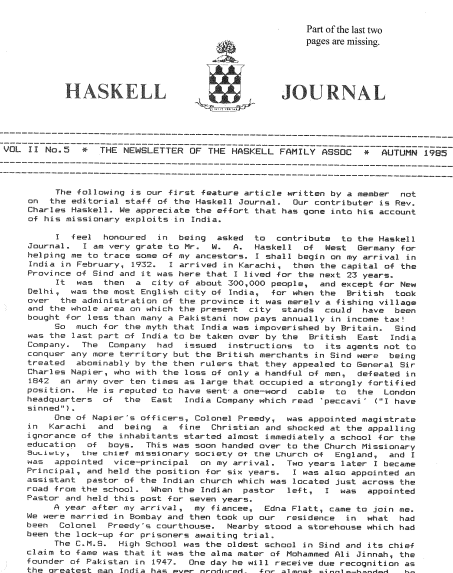
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CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS RATIFIED

ROGER, WILLIAM AND MARK: FOUNDERS OF THE HASKELL FAMILY IN NEW ENGLAND

The date and location have been set and the detailed planning is underway to make this a most memorable occasion for all who attend. The North Shore area of Massachusetts is rich in historic attractions of special interest to the Haskell family. It was here that the three Haskell brothers from Chatham, Maine, Roger, William and Mark settled, circa 1635. It was here that the great Puritan migration was concentrated. It was from this base that what has been described by historians as one of the most prolific of the early Puritan families, the Haskells, branched out to every corner of the USA. They were part and parcel of the settlement, development, growth and maturing of one of the greatest nations in the modern world.

We can do justice to the entire 354 year history of the Haskell family in the time we have at our disposal. The present day, in the short span of time we have at the Reunion so our focus will be on the lives and times of the three emigrant brothers: Roger, William and Mark and their children. Some of their 17th century houses still stand and the sites of their land holdings are known.

In addition to the attractions directly related to the Haskell family there is a plethora of other major historical attractions in this and adjacent areas. Just to mention a few - the sites of the Salem witchcraft, Indian wars and executions; East India trade museum, wharf, custom house and associated buildings; pristine examples of Federal style architecture; the first American architect, Samuel McIntire; beacons of many literary greats, Hawthorne, Whittier, Emerson, Thoreau, and Adams; sites of many famous battles, Lexington and

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IT'S THAT TIME AGAIN

With the ratification of the Constitution and By-Laws last July we moved to a once per year common renewal date for all members. It is obviously unfair to the regular dues paying members to have to pay for the printing and mailing of the Journal to delinquents as don't put it off.* The renewal form and a pre-addressed envelope are enclosed with this issue.

WHO! Hold on a minute. Please... consider the following before rushing to your checkbook (that's come as cheque book, mate). IHFA is a 100% volunteer run organization; no officer or board member gets paid a cent; all expenditures are solely for the benefit of the association; the dues are not a donation; your dues dollars are spent only for publishing and mailing the Journal, the compilation and publishing of the History of the Haskell Family and holding Reunions; it's a (hopefully) break-even operation.

REUNION IN ORBIT!

WESTWARD HO THE WAGONS !

Hitch up the mule team or yoke of oxen and point your wagon west. Relive the days of yore when Hasskells pulled up stakes in the overcrowded eastern seaboard states and headed west just as their forefathers had pulled up stakes in Charlton-Musgrove 200 years before and headed west to the new world. Hasskells left their "rock garden" in Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, and Massachusetts to join another great migration west in the 1800s just as their ancestors had joined the great Puritan migration of the 1600's. They went to Utah (see the story of Thales Haskell in the previous issue of this Journal) and California and Oregon and many points in between. They were farmers, blacksmiths, cordwainers, merchants, lawyers, laborers, clerks, forty-miners, seamen, and entrepreneurs in a wide variety of enterprises. Some found fame and fortune (see issues #23 & #24 of the Journal for the story of Charles N. Haskell first governor of Oklahoma) and some barely made ends meet and some just didn't make it.

Our Haskell Family Reunion in Provo, Utah will be a celebration of the Haskell participation in the prodigious, phenomenal "westward movement" of the American people that populated the nation from "sea to shining sea". 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CONGRESSIONAL MEDAL OF HONOR AWARDED TO MARCUS HASKELL

Washington, D.C. October 16, 1916. Marcus M. Haskell has received the Medal of Honor Certificate # 205 that he earned 34 years ago at the battle of Antietam. Issued under the provisions of an Act of Congress approved April 27, 1916 the citation reads:

This is to certify that Marcus M. Haskell was enrolled on the seventh day of August 1862 to serve three years, and was discharged on the ninth day of June, 1865, by reason of muster out of company, while holding the grade of Sergeant, in Company C, Thirty-fifth Regiment of Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry, that a medal of honor was awarded to him on the twelfth day of November 1896, for distinguished gallantry in the battle of Antietam, MD, September 17, 1862, where although wounded and exposed to a heavy fire from the enemy, when about to retreat from a position which his command had abandoned, he discovered a badly wounded comrade whom he rescued at the risk of his life and succeeded in conveying to a place of safety.

that his name was entered and recorded on the Army and Navy Medal of Honor Roll on the fourteenth day of June, 1916 as authorized under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved April 27, 1916, and that he is entitled to receive the special pension granted by that Act.

Given at the War Department, Washington, D.C. this sixteenth day of October 1916.

"HASKELL HOUSE"

In the 1930's Mr. A. H. Atkins, a well known sculptor, and his wife devoted a considerable amount of time, thought and money into restoring the home of William Haskell in West Gloucester, Massachusetts. They called it the Cape Ann Historical Society who soon after sold it back into private ownership and it remains so to the present date. The current owner (who has owned it for 26 years) has conducted a very extensive, painstaking and thorough research of the property and the people who have owned it. The first part of his research is presented in this issue. The article is about the people who have owned the "Haskell Grant of Land". As you read the article try to adjust your "frame of reference" to the living conditions and the absence of all forms of modern technology of that time period. You will have to envision what it is like to have no electricity and consequently no TV, no radio, no electric lighting, no

refrigeration, no dishwashers, no showers or flush toilets, no telephone, no air conditioning, no furnace, no window screens and no toilet paper. In your imagination replace these modern amenities with a few feeble candles, a crude fireplace, and a wooden bucket to haul water by hand from a well or spring. Replace your glass window panes with leaded parchment, your oak & tiled floors with dirt floors, your papered and painted plaster walls with rough burling, and your fireproof asphalt shingled insulated roof with a rough wood shingle roof. Stand in William's shoes (they were quite crude leather "Haskells") with clothes of home spun wool and flax. And don't forget your only mode of transportation was "Haskell mares" (your own two feet).

In January 1990, Donald Keith Haskell, CVO was appointed HM Ambassador to Peru, an honour for Mr. Haskell and his family as well as for the HIFA. Some may remember Keith as a lively after-dinner speaker at the reunion held on 4 July 1987 in Shaftesbury, Dorset UK.

Born in 1939, he was educated in Portsmouth, Hampshire and then at St. Catharine's College, Cambridge where a state scholarship led to a Classics degree and success in a highly competitive open examination for the Diplomatic Service. A wish to travel and live abroad were important considerations when deciding upon a career.

HASKELL: HERO OF GETTYSBURG Lieut. Haskell Saves the Day for Union Forces



"It's all my fault, I thought my soldiers were invincible!" General Robert E. Lee spoke these words to the stunned survivors of Pickett's Charge as they struggled back across the Confederate lines along Seminary Ridge at Gettysburg on that fateful afternoon, Friday, July 3, 1863.

For more than two years a myth of Southern military invincibility had been built up by a continuous string of Confederate victories in not only all the major battles up to that time but also in a host of lesser engagements. Then at Gettysburg, the most terrible blood-letting ever witnessed in North America, the Union forces under General Meade achieved a defensive victory that became the turning point of the war. It was a battle that raged for three days and culminated on the third day when Pickett's Charge at the "Angle" on Cemetery Ridge was repulsed by Union forces.

Gettysburg has often been called the "High Water Mark of the Confederacy". Most Civil War historians have cited it as the decisive battle, the turning point, of the Civil War and Pickett's Charge, the most critical action of that battle upon which hinged the Union victory.

FIRST IN WAR, FIRST IN PEACE AND

FIRST IN THE HEARTS OF HIS COUNTRYMEN. A description applied to George Washington, could be used to characterize Alexander Cheves Haskell (1839 - 1938), Colonel C.S.A., 7th S.C. Cavalry. He was one of twelve children, nine sons and three daughters of Charles (Thomas) and Sophia Lovell (Cheves) Haskell (and brother of Col. John Cheves Haskell) featured in the Winter 1993 issue, #33, of the "Haskell Journal".

Alexander graduated from South Carolina College in December 1860 and in January 1861, at 21 years of age, he and his brother, William, enlisted as privates in the 1st S.C. Volunteers. He served in this regiment at the siege of Ft. Sumter in Charleston Bay. He was commissioned a Lieutenant and served as Adjutant of Col. Gregg (Gen. General Gregg), went to Virginia with the regiment and participated in several battles - Antietam, Sharpsburg and Fredericksburg. He was wounded in the right shoulder at Fredericksburg, Dec. 1862, but recovered quickly and returned to duty in Feb. 1863. During 1862 he survived a boat with scurvy fever. In December a young wife of 14 months died leaving him with a baby daughter who was cared for by his parents in Asheville.

In May 1863 he participated in the battle at Chancellorsville and was wounded again (in the right arm). In about six weeks he had recovered sufficiently to rejoin his regiment on their retreat from Gettysburg.

His brother William was killed at Gettysburg and his brother Charles at Morris Island, Charleston. After several small engagements he was at the Second Battle of Cold Harbor (where Col. Franklin A. Haskell, U.S.A., was killed, see issue #32 of Haskell Journal) and was successful in stopping Gen. Custar's advance.

In this battle he and his horse were hit by seven rifle balls but only one of them penetrated his body and he was able to return to his regiment in a few days (he was quite crude leather "Haskells" with clothes of home spun wool and flax, and survived throughout the war with him, returning to Asheville in 1865). At this time he received his commission as Colonel and was placed in command of the 7th S.C. Cavalry regiment.

HIFA REORGANIZATION

AUTONOMOUS CHAPTERS PROPOSED

The following memorandum was sent to all members of the Executive Committee. The resolution contained therein was voted by ballot and approved, 17 in favor, 1 opposed and 2 not voting.

TO: Executive Committee Members
FROM: Mrs. Marion S. Anderson, Secretary
DATE: November 22, 1991
RE: EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING
November 16, 1991
Newburyport, Massachusetts

Quorum present: Richard E. Haskell, John H. Prunberg, Jr., Mrs. Marion S. Anderson, Richard A. Haskell, Diana C. Haskell, Amy H. Williams, George F. Sanborn and David L. Haskell

It was unanimously voted that the following proposal be submitted to the membership for a vote by ballot as provided for in the Constitution and Bylaws of the HIFA.

That the current Constitution and Bylaws be suspended, that two autonomous chapters be formed (USA/Canada and UK/Overseas), that two organizational/operations committees be formed and consist of the current officers and Board members in each area who shall govern the affairs of each chapter in their respective areas until such time as each Chapter drafts its own Constitution and Bylaws and this draft is approved by the majority vote of the membership in their area.

And that the HIFA be unincorporated in Massachusetts and that each Treasury shall consist of the funds now deposited to their respective accounts with the following exception: Life members shall have the option to choose the Chapter for their life membership and the Life membership fee (\$250) be transferred to that Treasury.

And that the Chapters exchange Journals and grant each other permission to publish articles and other materials from each other's Journal (giving all appropriate and due credit).

And that the chapters exchange reunion invitations so that all members of each Chapter are invited to each other's reunions.

And that the HIFA shall become an "umbrella" association for communication between the two autonomous chapters and have no control over the chapters. It shall function to maintain mutually agreed to social and informational exchanges.

It was unanimously voted that this proposal be submitted to the Executive Committee for a vote by ballot with a return date of December 15, 1991 to Mrs. Marion S. Anderson.

The secretary was instructed to dispatch this ballot to the Executive Committee by First Class/Air Mail and advise the members that, if he so desired, they could respond via FAX to George Sanborn ... and he would immediately forward it to the Secretary, Marion Anderson.

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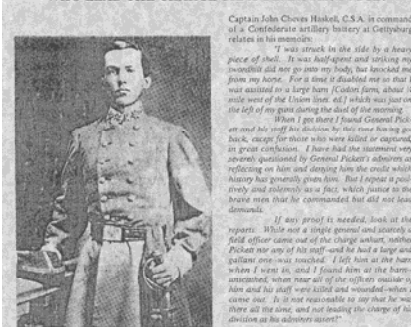

WHERE WAS PICKETT? WHO LEAD THE CHARGE THAT BEARS HIS NAME?



Colonel John Cheves Haskell, C.S.A., Army of Northern Virginia

Captain John Cheves Haskell, C.S.A. is command of a Confederate artillery battery at Gettysburg relates in his memoirs:

"I was struck to the side by a heavy piece of shell. It was half-gotten and striking my forehead did not go into my body, but knocked me from my horse. For a time it disabled me so that I was assisted in a large barn (Cotton farm, about 1/2 mile west of the Union line, etc.) which was just on the left of my gun during the day of the morning."

"When I got there I found General Pickett and was half dead from the effects of the shell. I was not hurt, except for those who were killed or captured, in great confusion. I have had them statement very often questioned by General Pickett's adherents as reflecting on him and denying him the credit which history has generally given him. But I repeat a positively and solemnly as a fact, which I have in the brain men that he commanded but did not lead demands."

"If any proof is needed, look at the reports. While not a single general and actually a field officer came out of the charge without being killed, none of his staff and he had a large and gallant one was wounded. I left him at the time when I was in, and I found him at the farm, unharmed, when near all of the officers outside of him and his staff were killed and wounded when I came out. It is not reasonable to say that he was there all the time, and not leading the charge of his battery."

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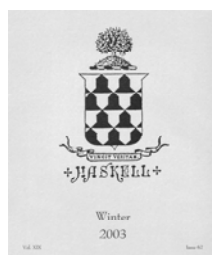

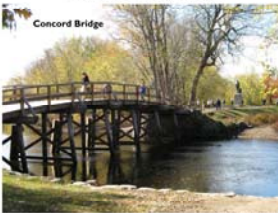

James "Madison" Haskell (William "Mason" Comfort "Mason" Jacob) "William" "William" was born in Augusta, Kentucky, March 24, 1823, and died on 25 Aug 1863 at Camp Letterman, Washington, DC. He was a sergeant in the 82nd Regt, Ohio Inf.

He wrote a Constitution for a Republic and was elected Governor and Commander-in-Chief for about a month until officers from U.S. warships ran

On the evening of December 5, 2011, we had just taken our third row, center seats to hear the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra's presentation of Handel's Messiah. At the bottom of the page following their logo, in large block letters was HASKELL, and under it, "America's Design Build Leader." On the bottom of the front cover was written "Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra - Fabio Biondi, Music Director / Principal Conductor, Haskell Endowed Chair." I also noted on

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HFA IHFS Collaboration

The search for Elnathan's story should have been easy, but as the search progressed it became more entangled. He seemingly did not know any sort of detailed record, and his military career began at age 19 and ended prior to his 29th birthday. What are known are several key dates in his military career and that he was very active during the Revolutionary War. The first item I received about Elnathan Haskell in the 1990s was a poor Xerox copy of his portrait from the Yale Art Museum that had the label "John-decamp to General Howe." When I showed this to another individual he stated that all Haskells were patriots – some were Tories. He had jumped to the conclusion that Elnathan was General Howe's "William Howe." This did not set well with me because my father had told me that he served George Washington. Only much later did I find out that the General Howe for whom Elnathan

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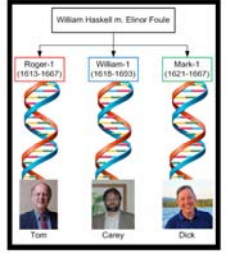
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The Haskell DNA

It is easy to understand how most Haskells in the USA are descended from one of the three brothers, Roger, William, or Mark, and therefore have William Haskell (1577-1630), who married Eleanor Foule, as a common ancestor. What is more surprising is many in that recent DNA studies of the Y chromosome (which occurs only in males) point to the fact that all living males today are descended from a single male, nicknamed Y-Adam, who lived in Africa about 60,000 years ago and maybe up to 100,000 years ago. Similarly, studies of the mitochondrial DNA (which is inherited only from a mother) leads to the conclusion that all females living today are direct descendants through the maternal line of a single female, nicknamed mitochondrial Eve, who also lived in Africa, but earlier than Y-Adam, somewhere between 120,000 and 200,000 years ago.

Charles W. Haskell and Lloyd B. Haskell, Jr. are the two Haskell family members whose names are inscribed on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington, D.C. in a sobering experience. The names of 58,272 American military personnel who died in the Vietnam War are carved on the shiny black marble wall. Two of the names are Haskell: Charles W. Haskell and Lloyd B. Haskell, Jr.

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Haskells and Shakers

"To this old Shaker half your ministers are a joy. You have accomplished a very great, we may say, a great and noble thing. You have not only maintained a perfect sense of scale in what I call 'bolder dimensions', i.e., total height, width, depth, length of individual parts, range, scale, but you have done so, etc., that the 'bolder dimensions' are in the same scale as the whole (the whole things) in range and scale, their aims and table legs."—Howard W. Haskell, former owner of the "William Haskell House", letter describing Shaker Haskell's craft.

One can appreciate the scale of the pieces shown by comparing the pieces with the scale of the Shaker and the Shaker. A black and white version of this photo appeared in the Winter, 2001 Issue #96 of the Haskell Journal on p. 11 along with some photos on p. 8 as part of Sharon Haskell's article "The Shakers". There were some Haskell Shakers, but did not leave many descendants due to their religious sense of celibacy. Back Howard and Sharon were inspired by visits to Old Chatham, NY which has a Shaker Museum and Library where Sharon Haskell has sold several miniatures and Howard had sold his Shaker furniture kits.

Sharon wrote in January, 2016: "When I received the fall issue of the Journal, I was saddened, but not awfully surprised to read of the passing of Howard W. Haskell, longtime owner and resident of the ancient William Haskell House in West Gloucester. When Virginia and I attended the 1980 HFA reunion in Danvers, the

This group picture was taken at the Royal Chase Hotel in Shaftesbury, Dorset, England, July 12, 2016—site of the first International Haskell Family Association Reunion held July 2-4, 1967 to celebrate 487 years of family history in Dorset (1800-1967). The meeting was arranged by Peter Haskell to welcome the Carey Haskell family's first trip to England.

During my all too brief visit to the English countryside, and using the article "Haskell's Shaker Wall Murals" as a guide, I was able to visit two other locations in the English countryside. My first and most in-depth visit was to the Church of St. Stephen in Shaftesbury, the church where William Haskell, father of the three brothers (William, Roger, and Mark) who made the journey to North America, served as Churchwarden 1627-1628, and the Baptismal site of all of William and Elmer Haskell's children. I also managed to visit two other locations that hold deep connections to the Haskell family: Fontwell Magna and the Domesday St Mary and Dun-Don-Don St Andrew area including Wootton Bassett.
