On the Saturday morning following the 3rd International Haskell Family Reunion, Ivan Haskell of Payson, Utah led a tour of that part of Payson informally known as Haskellville. 11 reunion attendees from the United States, Canada and England followed as Ivan led them to various points of interest in the area that his grandfather had homesteaded in the 1870's. It has developed into an enclave for his descendants over the years.

First stop on the tour was the Peteetneet School, named for one of the well known Native Americans of that area. The school which Ivan & his cousins attended is being renovated in order to serve as an art center. Ivan regaled us with the shenanigans of his father and uncle who were identical twins. Then we were shown some of Ivan's Hereford cattle on a section of the original homestead. This was followed by various stops pointing out some Haskell properties, one of which was the home of his cousin Afton, son of the identical twin. More stories were told about growing up in the valley. We also saw a gravel pit which produced much of the building cement used in the neighborhood and several of the survey rods marking the homestead boundaries. Among the local relatives who welcomed us warmly were Ivan's son Steve, one of many teachers in the Utah Haskell branch, and Duane, who's not only a teacher but a noted judge of quarter horses. More than one member of the tour was seen to carry away a souvenir horseshoe from Duane's spread.

Delowa, Ivan's wife, graciously provided a lunch of fried chicken and fresh vegetables with all the fixings, after which the group was shown the mountain area east of town. Ivan, who is a mine of information about local history and customs, pointed out the importance of water for this region. Until irrigation could be completed, the region was a desert of scrub and sage. The hospitality and great kindness displayed by these Mormon cousins could not be overstated. 





REUNION '91

Socializing with other Haskells, genealogical seminars, genealogical research, sightseeing the local attractions, an old fashion picnic with Mormon cousins these are just a few of the reasons for attending the Haskell Family Reunion. As those of us who have attended the first two IHFA reunions can verify, it is a unique experience giving each of us the opportunity to pursue those aspects of family and genealogical relationships that we value the most.

The Reunion is a golden opportunity for those who are interested in learning more about how to do genealogical research. The Later Day Saints, more commonly known as the Mormons, consider genealogical knowledge an integral part of their religion. This is why they have accumulated, at the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, the largest collection of genealogical material in the world. It contains over 165,000 published volumes and about 1.5 million reels of microfilm that identify well over one billion people from all around the world. The IGI (International Genealogical Index) contains something in excess of 120,000,000 surnames. And a very extensive, sophisticated computer system network with which to manage, access and update all these records.

At BYU you will have the chance to learn genealogical research methods from professional faculty who are not only experts in this field but talented, understanding teachers. My wife, Elizabeth, and I attended a week long Elderhostel in Intermediate Genealogy here in the spring of 1989 and we were genuinely awed by the competence and patience of the faculty. Having been a University administrator before retiring I have some insights into "corner cutting" tricks institutions of higher education sometimes employ to save dollars but I would have to report that everything I observed at BYU was a top notch operation - a quality program in "first class" facilities.

Not to be overlooked is the astonishingly low prices for the services of the BYU professional staff and the motel accommodations. The average "group" rate at motels in the northeast is in the \$65 to \$85 range for a double room compared to the "group" rate we are being offered of \$25 to

\$30. And northeast conference vendors would charge 2 or 3 times as much for the same quality of professional services. The costs of the Reunion are a real bargain!

So why not combine the Reunion with a vacation trip. There are a wealth of natural attractions in this general area. Especially notable are twelve national parks and monuments - Arches NP, Bryce Canyon NP, Canyonlands NP, Capitol Reef NP, Cedar Breaks NM, Dinosaur NM, Glen Canyon National Recreation Area, Natural Bridges NM, Rainbow Bridge NM, Timpanogos Cave NM, Zion NP and Grand Canyon NP. And for our English cousins who might get homesick we have the original London Bridge in Lake Havasu City, Arizona (it was bought and moved here in 1971 by Robert P. McCulloch, the founder of Lake Havasu City).

There are a number of attractions in the immediate vicinity of Provo. Utah Lake with excellent water sport and swimming facilities; Alpine Scenic Loop, 20 miles of spectacular mountain and canyon scenery; Bridal Veil Falls, with the world's steepest aerial tramway; Heber Creeper Railway, a scenic steam locomotive ride; Timpanogos Cave NM, with delicately sculptured formations; Sundance Resort, a year-round resort owned by Robert Redford; Cascade Springs SP; Mt. Nebo Scenic Loop; Livestock Auctions; McCurdy Doll Museum and the Springfield Museum of Art with one of the West's largest collection of American Art.

Nearby Salt Lake City has a wealth of Mormon related exhibits, not the least of which is the Tabernacle and the opportunity to hear the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, either giving a performance or in rehearsal.

In compliance with the rules and regulations of BYU there will be no alcoholic beverages or beverages containing caffeine served at our functions on campus. For those who are subject to withdrawal symptoms such as caffeine fits there are convenience stores adjacent to the campus where one can purchase a cup of coffee or at the motel restaurant before leaving for the campus. And for all the little old ladies who are used to a sip of sherry before turning in for the night there are discreet local dispensaries where one can stop on the way back to the motel.
